JOIN US, RAIN OR SHINE, AS WE PULL OUT ALL THE STOPS!

Once again D-Day Ohio, Inc. will invade the Lake Erie shores of Conneaut, Ohio, and stage the largest D-Day (1944) living history reenactment in the country. Featuring over reenactors from across the US and Canada, spectators will witness men, women, and their machines perform a living tribute to the veterans of WWII through dress, mock battles, and living history displays.

The event occurs within the beautifully kept grounds of Conneaut Township Park, in Conneaut, Ohio. Just off Interstate 90 (Exit 241), 5 miles west of the Pennsylvania border, Conneaut is just about half way between Cleveland Ohio and Erie Pennsylvania. There's plenty of free parking with speedy shuttles. *Entry is free but donations of any size are always appreciated as we are 100% funded by donations.

Though D-Day Conneaut is a very popular event, Conneaut Township park has plenty of room to comfortably stroll around and see amazing sites.(Be sure to check out the gallery). With an estimated yearly attendance of over 1400 reenactors from all over the US and Canada, there's little question why D-Day Conneaut has become the one of the largest WWII reenactment in the country.

US Postal System

Please be aware, when mailing a check you need to take the time to drop the envelope off inside the post office and not the mail box outside. We know of three individuals who dropped their envelope with a check inside in the mail box outside. One person who wrote a check \$67 had it changed and \$3,000 was withdrawn from their checking account. Another person said their check was changed to \$6,000 and that amount was withdrawn from their checking account. The US Post Office advises everyone to use the inside drop box to mail any letter with a check inside. This has happened to one of our members so be careful.

Ohio Veterans Memorial Park (OVMP)

If you haven't been to the Ohio Veterans Memorial Park since last summer then you need to stop by and see the new gazebo and the poured cement for the Tears of War (TOW) memorial. Plans are to complete the TOW this spring. The Park has three Eagle Scout candidates working on their Eagle Scout Service Projects.

- The first candidate designed and built 13 shadow boxes each containing a fold of the American flag including the meaning of each fold. The shadow boxes will be mounted in the ceiling of the gazebo with each box being lighted by LED lights.
- The second candidate is designing and building a flag burning pit to be used only for the purpose of retiring and disposal of the American flag.
- The third candidate will be working on an upgrade to the park's landscaping including replacing all of the mulch in the flower beds.

Honor Flight Cleveland

The mission of an Honor Flight Program is to celebrate America's veterans by inviting them to share in a day of honor at our nation's memorials. Have you ever wondered the cost of an Honor Flight: \$10 feeds 1 veteran at the memorial, \$25 feeds 1 veteran for the entire day, \$500 sponsors 1 veteran for the entire day event, \$1,800 pays for 1 motor coach for the entire day, \$10,000 sponsors a charter flight, and \$62,000 sponsors a charter flight for 100 veterans. Did You Know?

Nation owes its freedom to man in secluded Akron grave. Gary Powell

An American flag flutters over a secluded cemetery on a shady hill overlooking East Tallmadge Avenue and Home Avenue in North Akron.

Enclosed by a chain-link fence with a padlocked gate, the burial ground is the resting place of Revolutionary War hero Nathaniel Bettes and 60 of his descendants.

Thousands of motorists drive past Bettes Corners Cemetery every day without even knowing it's there. If it weren't for brave men like Bettes, though, there would be no Fourth of July celebrations - or the United States, for that matter.

Bettes was born in 1752 in West Springfield, Mass., and joined the call for independence after British soldiers clashed with colonists in Lexington and Concord in April 1775. As a minuteman, Bettes served in Col. John Fellow's regiment at the siege of Boston, joined Col. Benedict Arnold's expedition to Quebec and fought in the battle of Ticonderoga, N.Y., in Col. Edward Wigglesworth's regiment.

A private, ensign and fifer, he was promoted to sergeant in 1777 at West Point, N.Y. Bettes spent the grueling winter of 1777-1778 with Gen. George Washington's Continental Army at Valley Forge, Pa., battling starvation, illness and frostbite. After five years of service, multiple gunshot wounds and a few bayonet stabbings, Capt. Bettes petitioned in April 1780 for a military discharge.

According to a handwritten letter preserved in the National Archives, Bettes wrote directly to Gen. Washington: "I would beg leave to lay before Your Excellency, that I have been in the Service of these States the greatest part of the time, Since the Commencement of Hostilities.

"I have the Vanity to think, that my Conduct has been such as might deserve the Character of a good Soldier, and a faithful friend to my Country.

"I could with pleasure tarry longer in this Honorable Service, did not the pressing Necessities of my small family put it forever out of my power.

"Heaven as a Just chastisement has been pleased to Afflict my Family with sickness for better than two years together, which makes it absolutely Necessary for me to give them my Presence and personal Assistance.

"Which lays me under the Disagreeable Necessity to Request of your Excellency the favor of a Discharge. As in duty bound Shall ever Pray."

Washington granted the request, and three years later, the Revolutionary War ended. For his service, Bettes received a pension and about 500 acres from the state of Massachusetts, including 150 acres in the wilds of Ohio.

Bettes and his first wife, Hannah, had nine children before she died of tuberculosis. He and his second wife, Candice, had 10 children. About 1816, a nearly 65-year-old Bettes decided to move his family to Tallmadge Township in the Western Reserve of Ohio.

About 20 relatives took the six-week journey in covered wagons drawn by oxen. The family settled in a double log cabin in a forested area northeast of the present-day intersection of Tallmadge and Home avenues, a crossing that became known as Bettes Corners.

Hearing the sound of wood being chopped, local pioneers welcomed the newcomers to Ohio with loaves of freshly baked bread and a crock of beans.

The Bettes family transformed the rugged landscape into a cozy home, but danger often lurked underfoot.

"I well remember with what childish anticipations we watched the oven door being let down, displaying an oven full of nicely browned apple, mince and pumpkin pies," daughter Mary Bettes Allison wrote. "One morning as mother was sweeping the coals from the oven, she stood upon a large chip, several inches across. She noticed it was soft under the chip, but finished her work, and then looked to see the cause, which proved to be an immense rattlesnake coiled beneath it."

The best-known story about Nathaniel Bettes is when he got into trouble with the Tallmadge Church board of deacons on a charge of hunting on a Sunday. Bettes defended himself admirably about the sabbath day violation.

"Brethren, I started for the meeting on Sunday morning and had gone but a short distance when I saw a nice, fat buck standing right in my pathway," he told the board. "Being rather short of provisions, I asked the Lord if I might shoot that deer, and the Lord said 'yes.' So I went back to the house, got my Revolutionary rifle, killed the deer, took it home and dressed it, and then continued on to the meeting.

"Brethren, did I do right or wrong in obeying the voice of the Lord?"

Seeing the light, the panel voted unanimously to drop the charge.

Bettes witnessed great changes in the region, including the 1825 founding of Akron, which eventually annexed the neighborhood. Surveyors mapped out the Pennsylvania & Ohio Canal in the 1830s just west of the Bettes home.

The captain was 92 when he died in January 1840 - just three months before the canal opened. He was buried with military honors on the steep hill overlooking his home, the beginning of Bettes Corners Cemetery. About 60 descendants would join him in the family plot, including relatives with the surnames Hogue, Tibbals, Randall, Holmes and Everhart.

The cemetery, which today is hidden behind a factory building, fell prey to time, weather, neglect and vandalism over the years. Nathaniel Bettes' original marker toppled to the ground. In 1955, descendant Catherine C. Morrow of Chicago visited the plot and decided to donate a new headstone.

"We never expected to get an order for a monument to a Revolutionary War soldier - not in 1955 - but we are honored that we did," Paul Buzzi, vice president of the North Hill Marble and Granite Co. told the Beacon Journal at the time.

An American flag flutters over a secluded cemetery where an American hero rests. He helped give us freedom, but, ironically, citizens aren't free to stand at his grave. The padlocked gate is meant to keep vandals at bay.

Veterans Salute during the Pledge of Allegiance, Jim Oakes

SALUTING DURING THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE FOR VETERANS

Please be advised clarification as to saluting to the flag during the Pledge of Allegiance has been clarified by the National Defense Authorization Act of 2014 (NDAA2014). U.S. Code "Title 4 Section 4 - Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag; Manner of Delivery" has been amended by NDAA2014 SEC. 586.

MILITARY SALUTE DURING **RECITATION** OF PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE BY MEMBERS OF THE ARMED FORCES NOT IN UNIFORM AND BY VETERANS.

Section 4 of title 4, United States Code, is amended by adding at the end the following new sentence:
"Members of the Armed Forces not in uniform and veterans may render the military salute in the manner provided for persons in uniform."

Therefore, if a veteran not in uniform chooses to salute during the Pledge of Allegiance, they must stand at attention, salute, and remain silent during the pledge.

Ohio's Role in the American Revolution, friendsoffortlaurens.org



Fort Laurens is Ohio's only Revolutionary War Fort. In early 1778, General George Washington prepared a military plan to attack the British. The plan was to attack Fort Detroit because the British were encouraging their Indian allies in the area north of the Ohio River to attack American settlements in the frontier region.

Due to political pressure from the states of Pennsylvania and Virginia, and the inability to secure the necessary numbers of men and supplies, the expedition's original purpose was changed by the Continental Congress to simply attacking Indian towns and villages along the southwestern edge of Lake Erie.

Following a well-established Indian trail known today as the Great Trail, an American army of 1,200 men and their Delaware Indian guides marched west into the Ohio territory from Fort Pitt in the fall of 1778 under the command of Georgia native General Lachlan McIntosh. Twenty miles downriver from Fort Pitt near present-day Beaver, Pennsylvania, Fort McIntosh was constructed to store provisions and supplies. On November 4, 1778, McIntosh departed from there to head west toward the Sandusky towns.

As they neared the end of the year and the weather worsened, McIntosh arrived in the Tuscarawas Valley. He decided to forego the attacks on the Indian towns and to build a fort near the crossing of the Great Trail and the Tuscarawas River.

He would then leave a small garrison of 172 men and women at the fort and return to the area the following spring to continue his march toward Detroit or the Sandusky Towns.

Fort Laurens was built in late November, 1778, on the west bank of the Tuscarawas River near what is now Bolivar, Ohio. General McIntosh named the fort in honor of the President of the Continental Congress, Henry Laurens. The wooden stockade was approximately one acre in size. It was a quadrangular-shaped fort with four bastions approximately 240 feet from the top of one angle of a bastion to another. Barracks and storehouse buildings were located inside the walls.

A Significant Link to Ohio's Past

Fort Laurens remained an active American military post from November of 1778 through early August of 1779. During that time, the fort was clearly perceived by the British and their Indian allies in the northwest as a very serious threat. This was evident from the numerous attacks on the fort by Indians, Loyalists and British soldiers. These attacks resulted in the death of more than 20 American soldiers, who were later buried a short distance from the fort, near the fort hospital.



Just outside the Fort Laurens Museum, which houses many artifacts from the fort site, is The Tomb of the Unknown Patriot of the American Revolution. It pays lasting homage to at least one of the unknown defenders of the fort. The young man was laid to rest with full military honors from the Ohio National Guard in 1976.

The Wayne County Schools Career Center (WCSCC) Trade School Scholarship may be awarded to an applicant who is a post-secondary student, enrolled on a full-time basis in a STEM-based (Science, Technology, Engineering, or Mathematics) educational program at Wayne County Schools Career Center, located in Wayne County, Ohio.

The Vietnam Veterans of America (VVA) Chapter 717 Scholarship may be awarded to applicants who are relatives of The Vietnam Veterans of America (VVA) Chapter 717 members (relative is defined as being a biological child, stepchild, grandchild, niece, or nephew of an VVA Chapter 717 member). Applicant must be a post-secondary student, enrolled on a full-time basis at a 2-year accredited institution of higher learning (college/university or technical/vocational institution). Applicants should be pursuing a degree in a STEM-based (Science, Technology, Engineering, or Mathematics) program, including the pursuit of a Registered Nursing (RN) degree.

For both scholarship awards, first preference shall be given to applicants demonstrating financial need.
